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
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HUMANE SOCIETY GRAND OPENING




Thank You's

Ticks & Lyme Disease --- It's that time again!







When a tick hops onto your dog or cat, it's dinnertime for this nasty parasite. The tick will bury its mouth in your pet's skin, and can swell to 50 times its normal size, becoming engorged as it feeds on your pet's blood. Heavy infestation may cause anemia, especially in cats. There are some ticks that transmit serious infections, including Lyme disease, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, ehrlichia and babesia.

Successful tick control starts with prevention. Make your lawn unwelcoming to these parasites by mowing the grass regularly. Trim any weeds, as ticks favor vegetation as high as several feet off the ground. And as smaller ticks feed on smaller mammals, be sure your yard isn't a playground for rats and mice. Keep the lids securely on your garbage cans, and consider relocating your bird feeders if they're accessible to rodents.

Before a walk in the woods or other habitat frequented by ticks, arm your dog with protection. Try a spray or powder that's made with an appropriate insecticide. Your veterinarian can recommend the right product for your pet. Avoid walking in very thick underbrush and long grass, and be sure to check your dog when you get home. Ticks may be hard to spot, so go slow, and pay extra attention to your pet's ears, skull, feet and around the anus-these are perfect parasite hiding places. Also, check between the toes (including dewclaws) and underneath the paws, between the pads.

If you do find a tick on your pet, you'll need to remove it right away. First, wipe the tick and the surrounding area with rubbing alcehol. Grasp the tick with a pair of tweezers and, with a rotating action, gently pull the mouthpiece from your pet's skin. Never grasp a tick between your bare fingers. If an infected tick bursts during removal, you could be exposed to any disease it may be carrying. It's important that you remove the tick's mouth as well as its bloated body-any parts that remain behind could lead to an abscess or infection. And remember, throwing the tick in the garbage or flushing it down the toilet will not kill it. ASPCA experts recommend dropping the parasite into a small jar filled half-way with alcohol. Not only does this kill the tick, it preserves it. Should you suspect your pet has a tick-related infection, you can bring the specimen to your veterinarian for examination.

One word of advice - Never use the old remedy of applying heat (such as a match head or a cigarette) to a tick to get it to release. Researchers have found that ticks treated this manner will frequently spit up before they release, thereby transferring any pathogens they may be carrying into the host. The whole purpose of removing the tick is to prevent this from happening, so don't use heat under any circumstances. It's better to leave the tick where it is for a short while, until you can remove the tick properly.

Depending on the part of the country you live in, you'll need to be extra-alert for any signs that your dog or cat has contracted a tick-borne infection. Lyme disease is common in pets and people in the Northeastern United States, especially in Connecticut, where it was first identified. Babesia is more common in warm, humid areas of the South. Ehrlichia can be found throughout the United States, but it is most common in the south. And the tick that causes Rocky Mountain Spotted fever, which is not limited to western and mountain states, can cause disease in humans also. If your pet develops a bleeding disorder, sores, fever or diarrhea after exposure to ticks, or has lost his appetite or seems a bit stiff in the joints, contact your veterinarian.

A vaccine is now available for protecting dogs against Lyme Disease. This vaccine is initially given twice, at two week intervals. Annual revaccination is also necessary to maintain immunity. The vaccine has been shown to be safe and very effective. It is recommend for any dog that has exposure to ticks.



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s we look forward to the warm days and fun of the spring & summer months, there is one thing no one enjoys planning for:

Tornado Warnings

We may know what to do for ourselves during a tornado or tornado warning, but have you thought of how to properly care for your pet? Here are a few steps to ensure the safety of your family's pets during a potential disaster.

- 1. Assemble a Portable Pet Disaster Kit Keep the following items in an accessible place and store them in sturdy containers that can be carried easily. If you seek shelter in your basement, or have a tornado shelter, keep you disaster kit there. If not, keep handy so you can load it into your car if you need to evacuate quickly. Your kit should include:
 - Medications and medical records (stored in a waterproof container or laminated).
 - First aid kit.
 - Sturdy leashes, harnesses, and carriers to transport pets safely.
 - Current photos of your pets in case they get lost.
 - Food, portable water, bowls, cat litter/pan, and can opener.
 - Information on feeding schedules, behavior problems, and the name and number of your veterinarian in case you have to foster or board your pets.
 - · Pet beds and toys, if easily transportable.
- 2. What To Do As a Tornado Approaches Bring all pets into the house so that you won't have to search for them. Decide in which order you will take them to the disaster shelter/basement, and how you will ensure that they do not escape. (Cats can be very quick in running back up basement steps, or back through kitty doors!) You may not be home when the warning is issued. Find out if a trusted neighbor would be willing to take your pets and meet you at a prearranged location. This person should be comfortable with your pets, know where your animals are likely to be, know where your pet disaster kit is kept, and have a key to your home. If you use a pet-sitting service, they may be available to help, but discuss the possibility well in advance.




3. Caring for different types of animals in an Emergency Birds: Transport your bird in a secure travel cage or carrier. Larger birds can be transported in small bird cages. If you are seeking shelter in a cold environment, wrap a blanket over the carrier, or be sure to warm up your car before placing birds inside. During warm weather, carry a plant mister to mist the birds' feathers periodically. Try to keep the carrier in a quiet area.

Reptiles: Snakes can be transported in a pillowcase, but they must be transferred to more secure housing when they reach the shelter site.

Small Mammals: Transport them in secure carriers suitable for maintaining the animals while sheltered.

Micro-chipping: If you are separated from your pet during a tornado, having them micro-chipped will help you locate them through a national database. If you are interested in having your pet micro-chipped, talk with your vet, or call the Humane Society of Portage County at (715) 344-6012 for more information.



Your Pet's Health

Pet Food Alert

In light of the current news alert on the contamination of certain pet food and now dog treats we would like to remind you to take preventive steps to your pet's health. As this article may be out of date by time you read it, check your cans, bags and packages for the web site of your pet's food. Go to that site to see what their latest reports state for that particular brand. Keep a close eye on your cat and dog's daily functions. If you have any concerns call your Veterinarian. Many people are making their own pet food during this time. Lastly, as mom use to say "when in doubt, throw it out, better safe than sorry".

Sneaky Poisons...

There are many household hazards around that your pet can get sick on. Here is a list of seemingly safe items that can be perilous to your pet if ingested.

Lilies — A favorite flower of spring is the Easter lily. It can cause everything from a mild case of vomiting to serious kidney, liver or cardiovascular problems in cats. Beware of the entire lily family, including tiger, rubrum, stargazer and Japanese show lilies; all of them pose a danger.

Sweeteners – Using sugarless products to lose weight? Don't share them with your pets: Xylitol, the substitute sweetener used in many products even toothpaste, can cause a sudden drop in a dog's blood sugar, leading to a loss of coordination and seizures within 30 minutes of consumption. Vets don't know if cats are affected, so stash the stuff away from your feline too.


Painkillers -- The last thing a sick pet needs is the medicine you take. Ibuprofen, for example, can quickly damage a pet's organs, yet poisoning is commonly caused by well-meaning owners who give pills to their pets to relieve pain. Signs of an ibuprofen reaction include vomiting, diarrhea and increased thirst. Cats are thought to be twice as sensitive as dogs to the drug's toxic effects.

Fabric Softeners -- Within half an hour of gulping down even part of a fabric-softener dryer sheet, a pet can experience vomiting, muscle twitches and excessive drooling. Dogs, which some times will eat almost anything are more likely to be affected, but cats react more severely to the substance.

Pest Control -- Spring is here and you work hard at maintaining a bug free garden, but be careful of the chemicals you use. Curious cats or dogs can eat these products. "Most pesticides, fertilizer and herbicides used these days are relatively safe when used appropriately, but always read the label's warning" says Dr. Richardson, DVM. "The biggest dangers come from ant stakes that use a form of arsenic as well as baits to kill mice, flies, moles and gophers. If you think your pets ingested any chemicals take them to the vet immediately.






